Making the transition from general studies to being a successful nursing student.

FAMILY / HOME LIFE

- Less time available while in the nursing program for family and or to attend personal activities due to the academic rigors of the nursing program.
- Family and home life may not understand or support the demands needed to being a successful nursing student

ACADEMICS

- Success in general college courses does not translate to success in the nursing program.
- Liberty of focusing on one or few individual topics; In nursing, everything is included in the study
 - Theory, nursing skills, pharmacology, and clinicals

WORK

- While in the program, students are encouraged to prioritize their time outside of the classroom to allow for uninterrupted study periods. Some employers will work with you.
- Caution is advised when working fulltime hours while in the program

FAMILY / HOME LIFE

- The personal and economic rewards allow the individual to enjoy family and home life following the transition.
- Sacrifices made while studying in the nursing program are likely to have lasting benefits

ACADEMICS

- Being a successful ADSN student prepares the individual to consider higher education.
- Methods of study, interpretation of higher-though process events allow students to recognize how to best apply themselves and become successful students and scholars.

WORK

- The potential to having a career in nursing is typically cemented before the student nurse graduates from the program.

Steps to becoming a California Registered Nurse as per the CA BRN

- Take College prep classes in high school such as Math and Sciences
- 2. Choose the 'type' of nursing school you want to attend Associates, Bachelors, technical, etc.
- 3. Select a college and apply for admission (from prerequisites to completion of nursing school)
- 4. Apply for financial aid (take advantage of scholarships, loans, loan forgiveness programs, etc.)
- 5. Obtain the RN License

RN statistics


- Average <u>start</u> pay for a RN in the U.S. is \$24 to
 32/hour \$67,490 annually; with a graduate degree
 \$87,360 start
- Associate degree nursing is the minimum educational requirement to become an RN. Higher level advance practice is a BSN, Master's, and Doctorate in Nursing.



- 44.6 average age of RN and LVNs in U.S.





Cost of education outside of IVC

- •Tuition, fees, books and supplies for **LPN/LVN** training in a state-approved program typically costs **\$5,000-\$25,000** at a public college and **\$20,000-\$40,000** or more at a private school, depending on location, length of program (typically 12-18 months) and state residency status (for public schools).
- •Tuition, fees, books and supplies for an associate degree in nursing (ADN) can cost \$6,000-\$40,000 or more at a public college and \$30,000-\$100,000 or more at a private school, depending on location, length, school status, and the student's state of residency (for public schools). Living, transportation and personal expenses will vary.
- •Tuition, fees, books and supplies for a traditional four-year bachelor of science in nursing (**BSN**) typically cost \$40,000-\$200,000 or more, depending on whether it is a public or private school and its reputation. Tuition, fees, books and supplies for an accelerated BSN program -- for students who have already earned a bachelor's degree in a non-nursing subject -- can cost \$17,000-\$90,000 or more.
- •Diploma programs are the oldest and most traditional nursing education in the United States, and are still offered by a few hospitals. Tuition, fees, books and supplies can cost \$18,000-\$40,000 or more, depending on the hospital, length and location. and \$20,000-\$40,000 or more at a private school, depending on location, length of program (typically 12-18 months) and state residency status (for public schools).

- 1-year wait period to test for higher score
- Recommend using practice tests in study packet



How to Sign Up

- The IVC Nursing Program will be accepting the TEAS exam proctored remotely online by ATI or in-person at any school site or testing center such as PSI with a in-person proctor. IVC will not be offering the exam in-person. This remotely proctored exam offers a variety of secure exam settings including video, audio, and screen recording designed to maintain the integrity of the exam and ensure uncompromised exam results. Students interested in taking the exam must register at https://www.atitesting.com/
- The exam fee is \$115 and must be paid directly to ATI during registration. Please note that all questions regarding the TEAS remotely proctored exam must be addressed to ATI's customer service or by viewing the section "TEAS Exam FAQ's" on their website.

- Follow instructions on how to apply
- Notification 30-45 days after last day of deadline by email



Previous Convictions

- When applying, must disclose ANY and ALL criminal activity, including DUI's, traffic citations over \$1,000, expunged or sealed records, etc.
- Written one-page statement required with nursing application
- Include dates and description of incident(s)
- Failure to disclose constitutes dismissal of application

Convictions







Things to Know Cont.

- Know when to study for the TEAS Focus on completion of prerequisites first.
- Know the documentation required to apply
