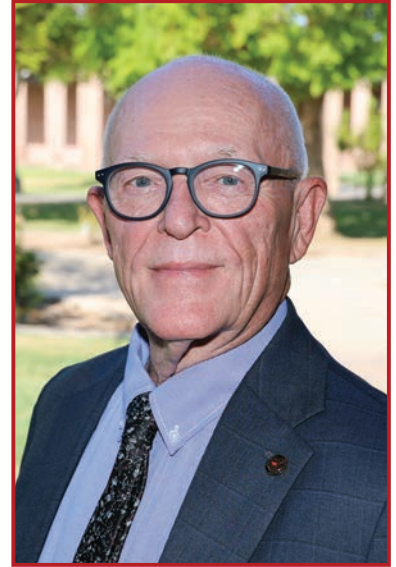

USING YOUR IVC STUDENT EMAIL ACCOUNT

All students have an IVC Student Email Account created for them when they complete the application process and is the email address the college will use to send you important student information. Each account comes with 50GB of Free Storage and Free Office Web Apps - Access, view and edit your online documents from home, the classroom, the library, or virtually any PC or Mac that is connected to the Internet!

How to access your IVC Student Email

1. Go to imperial.edu
2. Click on "Login" at the top, and then select "Student Email Login."
3. If this is your first time logging in after entering your student email, you will be asked to provide a personal email where a security code will be sent.
4. Once the security code is verified, your password will be your date of birth (DOB) in the format MM/DD/YY (for example, 063006).
5. If you need to reset your password, please contact Admissions & Records at (760)355-6101.



OTHER USEFUL STUDENT TOOLS

IVC offers many tools to help you succeed. Some of the tools you will use as an IVC student include:

Canvas

Portal to take online classes and see assignments, announcements, grades, and more.



WebSTAR

Use WebSTAR for registering for classes, ordering official transcripts, reviewing your academic records, checking your Financial Aid status.

Degree Works

Sign in to Degree Works for student education planning. View the classes that you have completed and which graduation requirements they fulfill, as well as which ones are still needed in order to complete a particular major or certificate.

My Priority Registration Times

Find your registration date & time. This is the earliest time that you will be able to add and drop classes.



HELPFUL TIP!

***Don't be afraid to ask questions...
We're here to help you succeed!***

- It's important to communicate with your instructors, counselors, coaches, and supervisors, especially if you need help or have questions.
- Some instructors have office hours where you can ask questions and get to know your instructor better.
- When emailing, make sure to always use your student email and include your name, student ID number, and the class course. Use appropriate language, respectful greetings, and proofread before sending.
- Some instructors prefer to communicate via Canvas. Check your syllabus to see which method you should use. You won't be able to access Canvas until you are enrolled in the course.

IVC ACADEMIC COUNSELING

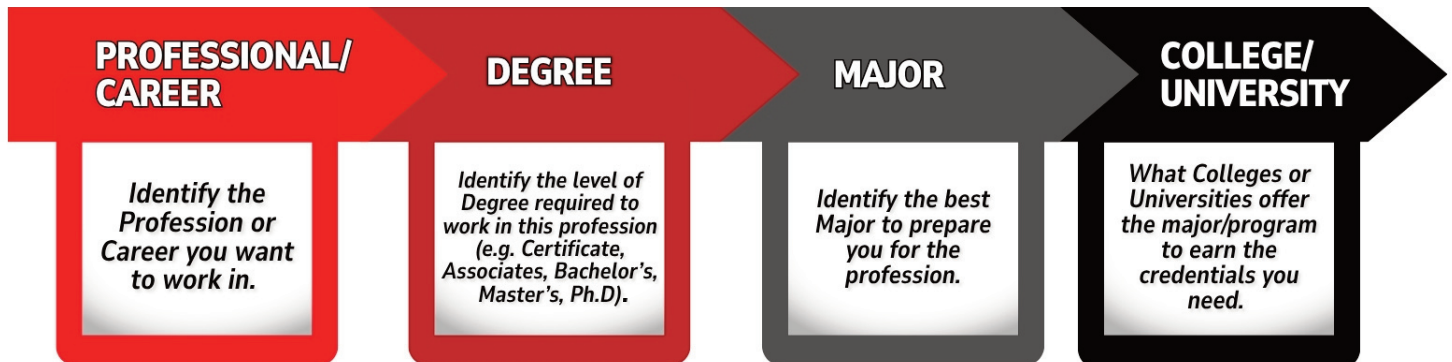
Academic, personal, and career counseling for students is a critical part of the planning process to:

The profession you want to work in is directly linked to the major you want to pursue, so let's work backwards:

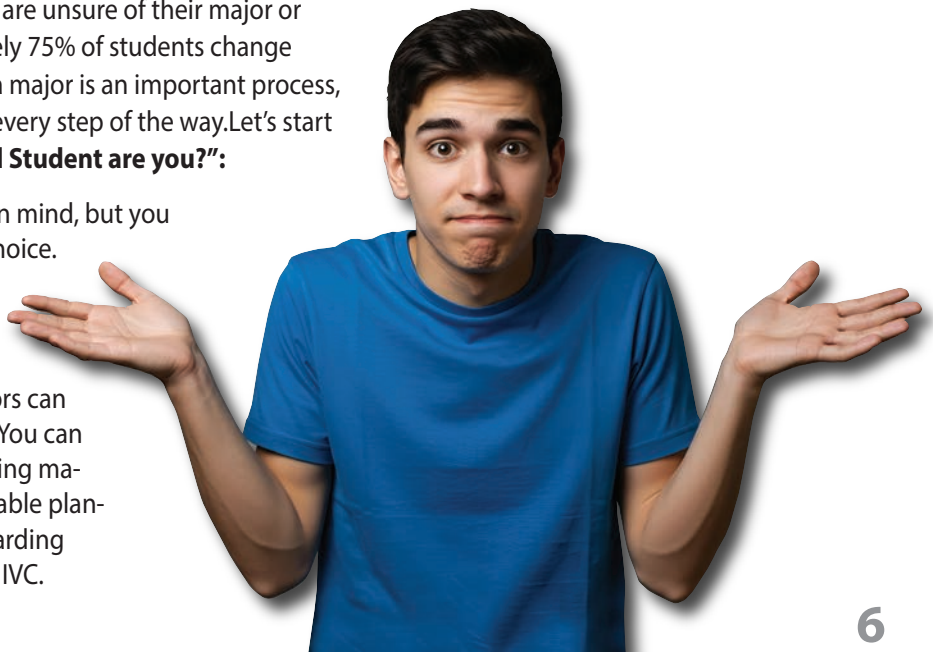


WHAT IF I'M NOT SURE OF MY MAJOR?

An estimated 20–50% of students entering college are unsure of their major or consider themselves “Undecided,” and approximately 75% of students change their major at least once during college. Selecting a major is an important process, and Imperial Valley College is here to support you every step of the way. Let's start with a simple question; **“What type of Undecided Student are you?”**:

- ☐ You have two or three career paths or majors in mind, but you need more information to make a confident choice.
- ☐ You're not sure where to begin and need help identifying your interests and options.

No matter where you're starting from, IVC counselors can guide you based on your specific needs and goals. You can also visit our Career Services Center for help exploring majors, taking career assessments, and accessing valuable planning tools. See page 7 for detailed information regarding all of the career pathways available to you through IVC.



DID YOU EARN COLLEGE CREDIT WHILE IN HIGH SCHOOL?

If you earned college credit while in high school, let us know. The following are typical forms of college credit that could be learned:

1. Advanced Placement (AP) Test Score
2. Dual Enrollment Coursework (Community College)
3. High School Enrichment Coursework (Community College)

STUDENT EDUCATION PLAN (CSEP)

Counselors will assist you in developing a Student Education Plan (CSEP). The CSEP is an important tool you will need to register for classes as it will:

- Identify your academic goal, current major, and professional goal.
- Outline recommended coursework based on major, transfer plan, and sequence of courses.
- Maintain your priority registration eligibility.

A CSEP will list semester by semester the classes you need to take to complete your major and graduate and/or transfer in a timely manner.

Every IVC student needs to have one on file. It's easy to setup and will save you time, money and will help you achieve your academic goals faster.



GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS



General Education (G.E.) is a program of courses in the arts and sciences that provides a broad educational experience. Courses are usually introductory in nature and provide students with fundamental skills and knowledge in English, arts, humanities, mathematics, social sciences, physical and biological sciences.

Both Associate and Bachelor degrees require some amount of General Education. Each institution has its own requirements and these requirements can vary within the institution according to the major.

For students who are undecided about a major and undecided about a transfer school, the IGETC or the CSU General Education pattern may be a good pattern with which to start.

ENSURE YOUR BASIC NEEDS ARE MET!

STUDENT EQUITY & ACHIEVEMENT

The Student Equity & Achievement Program (SEA) at Imperial Valley College facilitates a smooth transition to college, supporting all students, especially those underrepresented. The team assists with applications, testing, orientation, counseling, registration, and grants, and advocates for various groups. Recognized as a best-practice, SEA includes initiatives for basic needs, a kitchen & farm-to-table program, military & veteran success, the PUENTE Project, Resilient Scholars, and Restorative Justice Programs.



PAYING FOR COLLEGE!

FINANCIAL AID STEPS



Everyone has the opportunity to receive some type of financial aid, although many students assume they aren't eligible. Did you know that first-time, **full-time college students may qualify for free tuition** through the California College Promise Grant even regardless of income? Follow the steps below to apply for financial aid at Imperial Valley College.

STEP 1: COMPLETE YOUR FAFSA OR DREAM ACT APPLICATION

- **FAFSA** (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) is for U.S. citizens, permanent residents, and eligible non-citizens. Apply at <https://studentaid.gov> IVC Federal School Code: **001214**
- **CADAA** (California Dream Act Application) is for undocumented AB 540 eligible students. Apply at <https://dream.csac.ca.gov>
- Not sure which one you should fill out? Contact the IVC Financial Aid Office for help.

STEP 2: CHECK YOUR IVC EMAIL FOR FOLLOW-UP

- After you apply, the **IVC Financial Aid Office** will contact you via your IVC student email about any required documents or next steps. Make sure to:
 - a. Log in to WebSTAR to track your application status.
 - b. Submit any required documents as soon as possible.

STEP 3: ACCEPT YOUR AID

- Once awarded, you must accept your **Terms and Conditions** in WebSTAR before funds can be disbursed.
- Aid is disbursed through **BankMobile** (direct deposit or debit card). Instructions are provided during onboarding.



HELPFUL TIPS!

Apply for Financial Aid Early!

- Remember that many funds are awarded on a first come, first serve basis, so it's important to make sure you apply and complete your financial aid file early!
- In addition to state and federal aid, other scholarships may be available. Visit our scholarship website at ivcf.awardspring.com for more information.
- To maintain your financial aid eligibility, you must meet the Satisfactory Academic Progress (SAP) policy, which states you must:
 - a. Maintain a minimum cumulative 2.0 GPA.
 - b. Receive credit for at least 67% of the total units attempted.
 - c. Attempt less than 150% of the maximum cumulative units for your program.

SCHOLARSHIPS

The Imperial Valley College Foundation raises funds each year to fund hundreds of thousands of dollars in scholarships for IVC students. As opposed to Financial Aid, which is awarded by need, scholarships are based on merit. The top applicants for each scholarship are selected by various scholarship committees.

ONLINE VS. FACE-TO-FACE CLASSES



Find the class format that fits how you learn best.

Online (Asynchronous)

No set meeting times. All coursework is completed on Canvas at a flexible pace, as long as deadlines are met.

- ✓ **Good for:** working independently, staying on top of deadlines, and not needing frequent reminders.

Real-Time Online (Synchronous)

Live Zoom sessions are typically held twice a week at scheduled times, similar to a face-to-face class, but attended remotely. Coursework will be completed on Canvas.

- ✓ **Good for:** live interaction and a set schedule without needing to come to campus.

Hybrid

A mix of in-person and online learning. Most classes meet on campus once a week, with the rest of the work completed online on Canvas.

- ✓ **Good for:** getting face-to-face interaction with instructors but still having some flexibility.

Face-to-Face

Most classes meet fully on campus twice a week on set days and times.

- ✓ **Good for:** in-person learning and maintaining a consistent routine.

Conclusion:

Think about how you learn best.

Do you prefer structure or flexibility? Are you comfortable using Canvas or Zoom? Do you focus better when you're in a classroom? Choosing the right class format can make a big difference.

8 WEEK ACCELERATED CLASSES



Study Smart, Finish Fast: IVC 8-Week Classes

Balancing college, work, and family? IVC's 8-Week Accelerated Classes make it easier to reach your goals without giving up your time or energy. These short-term courses cover the same material as a regular 16-week class, but in half the time. You'll meet more often, stay more focused, and finish faster. It's college designed for your real life.

Here's why students love the 8-Week format:

- Take 2–3 classes at a time and still earn a full semester’s worth of credits.
- Stay focused with shorter timelines and fewer distractions.
- Feel less stress and avoid burnout.
- Build stronger connections with classmates and instructors.
- Graduate or transfer faster.
- Enjoy more flexibility to balance school, family, and work.

COMMON COURSE NUMBERING (CCN) SYSTEM

As a result of AB 1111, California Community Colleges are in Phase 2 of adopting a common course numbering system for all general education and transfer pathway courses. The purpose of the CCN system is to ensure that comparable courses across all community colleges have the same course number. The goal is to streamline the transfer process from California Community Colleges to four-year postsecondary educational institutions and reduce excess credit accumulation.

The chart below provides a list of courses that will be offered throughout the SCCCDC with a comparison of the current course prefix and number and the new course prefix and number based on the CCN system. Now that you are officially a IVC Desert Warrior, here are some helpful tips to remember!

BEFORE THE SEMESTER STARTS:

- ☐ **CHECK YOUR COLLEGE EMAIL DAILY**
Your email is the main method the college uses to send you information including deadlines, financial aid, etc. You can also forward your student email to an email address you check more frequently.
- ☐ **COMPLETE YOUR FINANCIAL AID/PAY FEES**
After completing the FAFSA or Dream Act Application, check your student email daily for important information such as required forms. Even if your tuition is covered by aid, there may be additional fees. Check your account balance in WebSTAR.
- ☐ **GET YOUR DESERT WARRIOR CARD (STUDENT ID)**
Your student ID has many benefits! Get your Desert Warrior Card in the Welcome and Student Success Center.
- ☐ **PURCHASE A PARKING PERMIT**
Purchase a permit at the Campus Safety and Parking Office in room 2603 or complete your parking permit registration online using their Imperial Valley College credentials at the Manage Parking Account.
- ☐ **PURCHASE YOUR BOOKS AND SUPPLIES ONLINE**
Visit IVC's Virtual Bookstore at www.imperialvalleystore.com. Ordering your course materials online is easy. Simply log in with your IVC Student ID to view all required and optional materials for your IVC courses.
- ☐ **GET TO KNOW YOUR CLASS SCHEDULE**
Your class schedule can be found on the main page after logging into My Portal or in Self Service. It includes the date, time, location, and instructor information.



ONCE THE SEMESTER STARTS:

- ☐ **ATTEND YOUR CLASSES**
Attend all of your classes, especially on the first day. Check Canvas daily for online courses.
- ☐ **SEE A COUNSELOR BEFORE YOU REGISTER FOR NEXT SEMESTER**

FEES AND REFUNDS

ALL fees are subject to change without advanced notice by the State of California. The information published below reflects legislation, policies and fees in effect at the time of publication. Students who fail to pay enrollment fees, health fee, instructional materials fee, or nonresident fees in a timely manner risk not being eligible to register and/or being dropped for non-payment.

NOTE: If you participate in priority registration you will have five (5) business days from the first point of enrollment to pay all fees generated as of that day or you may be dropped from all classes and wait lists. If you sign up for a payment plan (Nelnet) you will not be dropped from your classes.

Enrollment Fee - Resident Student \$46.00 per unit

The Enrollment Fee is mandated by the California State Legislature, with the approval of the Governor and requires all California Community Colleges to charge students a Tuition/Enrollment Fee each term. The Legislature has also provided for financial assistance and fee waivers for low income students who cannot afford to pay this fee and who qualify according to State guidelines. Information for financial assistance and fee waivers can be obtained from the IVC Financial Aid Office.

Foreign and Non-Resident Enrollment Fee \$367.00 per unit

Enrollment Fee - Nonresident and International Students
Nonresidents and international students are required to pay tuition charges of \$367.00 per unit in addition to the fees outlined above. The college will accept payment from nonresident and international students in cash, Western Union money orders, traveler's checks, credit cards, debit cards, and bank drafts. Personal checks cannot be accepted. Payment of nonresident and international student tuition cannot be deferred.

Student Health Fee

The Student Health Fee provides a full-range of health services to IVC students including immunizations, physical exams, basic first aid, health education programs, TB testing, HIV testing, cholesterol screening, blood pressure screening, mental health services and other health services to be determined.

Instructional Materials Fee

Required of all students enrolled in certain courses. Courses may carry a nominal fee for instructional materials provided to students throughout the semester.

Student Representation Fee

The Student Representation Fee is expended by the college solely for the purpose of student advocacy efforts to Federal, State, and local governments. Students have the right to refuse to pay the fee for religious, moral, political, or financial reasons. Student Representation Fee \$2.00 per term.

Parking Fee

Required of all students who park on campus, at the following rates. Note: Students enrolled solely in off-campus classes are not required to pay the parking fee.



Purchase a permit at the Campus Safety and Parking Office in room 2603 or complete your parking permit registration online using their Imperial Valley College credentials at the Manage Parking Account.

Other Fees/Charges

Insufficient Funds Check Charge – There will be a charge of \$25.00 for checks returned to the college because of insufficient funds.

Refund Policy

There is no need to apply for a refund. All eligible refunds will be processed automatically according to the financial aid disbursement schedule, except for periods of registration or late registration.

Credit Card Refunds – Students may request a credit card refund if their original payment was made by a credit card. Refunds may be requested by calling (760) 355-6464 or (760) 355-6240.

Diploma/Certificate Fees

Imperial Valley College does not charge for the initial Diploma or Certificate. A Diploma and/or Certificate will be withheld if the student owes any fees to IVC. A student may order a reprint of a diploma/certificate at the cost of \$20 of each diploma or certificate. Duplicate degree requests will have a charge as noted above.

Transcript Fee

Imperial Valley College is able to offer our current and alumni students transcripts from Parchment. It's easy to use, secure, and it's available 24/7. Parchment will deliver your official transcript anywhere you need it to go - other colleges and universities, scholarship funds, employers, even to yourself if you need it. Student Inmate Transcripts

Imperial Valley College will provide official transcripts free of charge to current IVC student inmates at the prisons that IVC offers instruction to. The request will be limited to two transcripts per semester while the student inmate is enrolled. Requests for transcripts from other student inmates (not a current IVC student) and other prison sites are treated as any other student.

STUDENT POLICIES

STUDENT RIGHTS AND GRIEVANCES POLICY

Grievance: A claim by any Student who reasonably believes a college decision or action has adversely affected his/her/their status, rights, or privileges as a student. A Grievance includes, but is limited to, claims regarding:

- Refusal of instructor to confer with a student;
- Financial aid [unless the District's financial aid policy contains an appeal procedure;
- Course grades, to the extent permitted by Education Code Section 76224(a), which provides: "When grades are given for any course of instruction taught in a community college District, the grade given to each student shall be the grade determined by the instructor of the course and the determination of the student's grade by the instructor, in the absence of mistake, fraud, bad faith, or incompetency, shall be final." "Mistake" may include, but is not limited to errors made by an instructor in calculating a student's grade and clerical errors;
- The exercise of rights of free expression protected by state and federal constitutions and Education Code Section 76120.

A Grievance is not:

Student disciplinary actions, which are covered under separate Board policies and Administrative Procedures. Police citations (i.e. "tickets"); complaints about citations must be directed to the County Courthouse in the same way as any traffic violation.

INFORMAL RESOLUTION - Each student who has a grievance shall make a reasonable effort to resolve the matter on an informal basis prior to requesting a Grievance hearing, and shall attempt to solve the problem with the person with whom the student has the Grievance, that person's immediate supervisor, or the local college administration.

The student may discuss the problem with the individual or the individual's supervisor. If a mutually satisfactory understanding has not been reached with the other person, the student may, within five (5) instructional days, present the Student Grievance to the immediate supervisor. Student Grievance form information may be found under the Formal Resolution section of this AP. Within (2) two days following receipt of a grievance, the immediate supervisor shall advise the student of his or her rights and responsibilities under these procedures, and assist the student, if necessary, in the preparation of the Grievance form. The supervisor must respond via verbal communication or email within ten (10) instructional days of the initiation of the grievance.

STUDENT CODE OF CONDUCT STATEMENT

Imperial Valley College is maintained for the purpose of providing students in the community with programs of instruction in higher education. The College is concerned with the fostering of knowledge, the search for truth and the dissemination of ideas. Free inquiry and free expression are indispensable to the achievement of these goals. As members of the College community, students are encouraged to develop the capacity for critical judgment and to engage in a sustained and independent search for truth. Students at Imperial Valley College may rightfully expect that the faculty and administration will maintain an environment where there is freedom to learn. This requires that there be appropriate conditions and opportunities in the classroom and on campus. As members of the College community, students shall be encouraged to develop the capacity for critical judgment and to exercise their rights to free inquiry and free speech in a responsible non-violent manner. Students shall assume an obligation to conduct themselves in a manner compatible with the college's function as an educational institution. Students shall observe the rules and regulations of the College and shall refrain from conduct which interferes with the College's teaching and administration, or which unreasonably interferes with the rights of others. Misconduct while on the college campus, or at a College-sponsored function for which students and student organizations are subject to disciplinary action.

Definitions: The following conduct shall constitute good cause for discipline, including but not limited to the removal, suspension or expulsion of a student.

Questions should be directed to the Dean of Student Affairs & Enrollment Services.



IVC STANDARDS OF CONDUCT

- (1) Causing, attempting to cause, or threatening to cause physical injury to another person.
- (2) Perpetrating, attempting, or threatening dating violence, domestic violence or stalking against another person.
- (3) Possession, sale or otherwise furnishing any firearm, knife, explosive or other dangerous object, including but not limited to any facsimile firearm, knife or explosive, unless in the case of possession of any object of this type, the student has obtained written permission to possess the item from a District employee which is concurred in by the college president.
- (4) Unlawful possession, use, sale, offer to sell, or furnishing, or being under the influence of, any controlled substance listed in California Health and Safety Code Sections 11053 et seq., an alcoholic beverage, or an intoxicant of any kind; or unlawful possession of, or offering, arranging or negotiating the sale of any drug paraphernalia, as defined in California Health and Safety Code Section 11014.5.
- (5) Committing or attempting to cause damage to District property or to private property on campus.
- (6) Causing or attempting to commit robbery or extortion.
- (7) Stealing or attempting to steal District property or private property on campus, or knowingly receiving stolen District property or private property on campus.
- (8) Willful or persistent smoking in any area where smoking has been prohibited by law or by regulation of the college or the District.
- (9) Sexual assault or sexual exploitation regardless of the victim's affiliation with the district.
- (10) Committing sexual harassment as defined by law or by District policies and procedures.
- (11) Engaging in harassing or discriminatory behavior based on disability, gender, gender identity, gender expression, nationality, race or ethnicity, religion, sexual orientation, or any other status protected by law.
- (12) Engaging in intimidating conduct or bullying against

another student through words or actions, including direct physical contact; verbal assaults, such as teasing or name-calling; social isolation or manipulation; and cyberbullying.

(13) Willful misconduct that results in injury or death to a student or to District personnel or which results in cutting, defacing, or other injury to any real or personal property owned by the District or on campus.

(14) Disruptive behavior, willful disobedience, habitual profanity or vulgarity, or the open and persistent defiance of the authority of, or persistent abuse of, college personnel.

(15) Cheating, plagiarism (including plagiarism in a student publication), or engaging in other academic dishonesty.

(16) Dishonesty; forgery; alteration or misuse of District documents, records or identification; or knowingly furnishing false information to the District.

(17) Unauthorized entry upon or use of District facilities.

(18) Lewd, indecent or obscene conduct or expression on District-owned or controlled property, or at District sponsored or supervised functions.

(19) Engaging in expression which is obscene, libelous or slanderous, or which so incites students as to create a clear and present danger of the commission of unlawful acts on District premises, or the violation of lawful District regulations, or the substantial disruption of the orderly operation of the District.

(20) Persistent, serious misconduct where other means of correction have failed to bring about proper conduct.

(21) Unauthorized preparation, giving, selling, transfer, distribution, or publication, for any commercial purpose, of any contemporaneous recording of an academic presentation in a classroom or equivalent site of instruction, including but not limited to handwritten or typewritten class notes, except as permitted by any District policy or administrative procedure.

DISCLAIMER

Imperial Valley College is committed to a safe and equitable learning environment for all students and employees. "The U.S. Department of Education's Office for Civil Rights (OCR) enforces, among other statutes, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972. Title IX protects people from discrimination based on sex in education programs or activities that receive Federal financial assistance. Title IX states that:

No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance." U.S. Department of Education - Office of Civil Rights Examples of the types of conduct that could violate Title IX include, but are not limited to:

- Pressure for sexual activity
- Dating or domestic violence
- Sexual innuendos and comments
- Sexually explicit questions
- Requests for sexual favors
- Unwelcome touching, hugging, stroking, squeezing Spreading rumors about person's sexuality
- Sexual ridicule
- Displaying or sending sexually suggestive electronic content, including but not limited to emails, text messages, etc.
- Pervasive displays of pictures, calendars, cartoons, or other materials with sexually explicit or graphic content
- Stalking a person
- Attempted or actual sexual violence

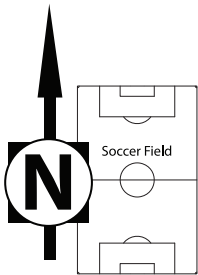

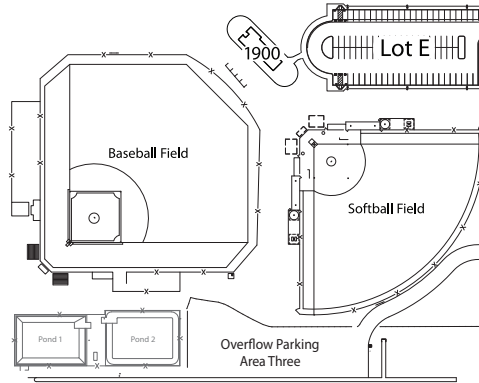
